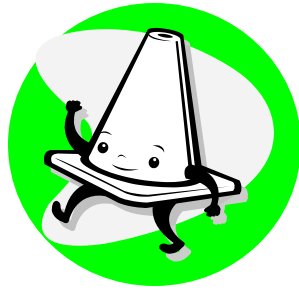

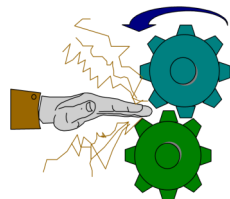

LET'S PREPARE FOR WINTER DRIVING

With the fall and winter driving season arriving, snow and ice can pose challenges for even the most experienced driver. Here are a few tips and a brief refresher:

- If your area has experienced snow fall, remove all snow and ice from your vehicle completely. This includes the hood, trunk and top of your vehicle; it will prevent snow from being blown onto your windshield or the windshield of other drivers. Make sure your mirrors, head and tail lights are free of snow and ice.
- Due to the changing weather conditions you must plan ahead to allow for extra time while traveling.
- Leave plenty of room between you and other vehicles.
- Make sure your vehicle is in good condition for the winter weather ahead. Check the condition of your tires, brakes, windshield wipers, heater / defroster, anti-freeze, battery connections, belts, and it is a good idea to change to a de-icing windshield wiper solution.
- Avoid letting your gas tank run low.
- Pay particular attention to work zones, maintenance vehicles and plows. Give them plenty of room and try not to cut in front of large vehicles which may be unable to stop in time.
- Practice your winter driving skills mentally.
- With anti-lock brakes apply constant firm pressure to the pedal. Never pump the ABS brakes. If your rear wheels start to skid, steer into the direction of the skid and don't over correct.
- Look farther ahead in traffic. Actions by other drivers will alert you to problems and give you extra time to react.
- It's a good idea to have a winter emergency car kit— ice scraper, snow brush, extra gallon of wiper fluid, a blanket, some warm clothes, flashlight, cell phone with extra batteries, jumper cables and a general first aid kit.



With all this in mind it should be a good driving season and a safe one.
